DEAR FRIENDS,

An important piece of legislation for Michigan Zoos was passed at the end of 2018 allowing the breeding of large carnivores in Michigan with proper qualifications. The changes to the Large Carnivore Act in HB 5778 promote the responsible breeding of wildlife, including endangered species, for future generations.

John Ball Zoo fully supports the passage of HB 5778 so that we and other zoos across the state can preserve endangered species, including large carnivores, such as Amur tigers, snow leopards, and lions.

The changes to the Large Carnivore Act are an important step toward better public safety along with enhanced animal welfare. And, most importantly, a positive step forward in the conservation of endangered species. These changes mandate that institutions requesting to breed large carnivores must meet strict criteria of public safety, animal welfare, and responsible conservation minded breeding.

The passage of the changes to the Large Carnivore Act allows us to be a more active participant in the conservation of endangered species such as our endangered Amur tigers. We already have a top-notch facility with the opening of the Crawford Tigers Realm in 2014. Anticipating a day when we could breed tigers, the habitat already has a cub den ready for babies.

We are very excited at the prospect of breeding Amur tigers but know that this is a process. We are beginning the application process with the state of Michigan, have informed the Species Survival Plan of our ability to now breed, and begun internal implementation plans. We anticipate the process to take a few years.

The passage of HB 5778 was a true concerted effort by many who understand the act's positive implications. John Ball Zoo would like to specifically thank Representative Thomas Albert for sponsoring the bill, along with former Governor Rick Snyder, former Lieutenant Governor Bryan Calley, Senator Joe Hune, Senator Tom Barrett, and Diane Thompson CEO of Binder Park Zoo for their efforts.

New Arrivals

We have many new animals joining us throughout 2019 and are excited to introduce them to you!

Toco Toucan

This beautifully colored bird is recognized as the largest species in the toucan family. They flaunt the biggest bill in regard to body size of all birds. The large yellow-orange colored bill with a distinct black marking at the tip is the bird's most noticeable feature. They will make their appearance at JBZ in late spring or early summer.

Meerkats

These small, charismatic mongoose are certain to be a guest favorite! Their habitat's construction begins this spring in the hope that they can join us later this year. With a weight of only 1 or 2 pounds and a height of 10 to 12 inches, these engaging animals are highly social and live in groups called mobs.

Cape Porcupine

Joining the meerkats will be a cape porcupine. They are terrestrial, nocturnal and the largest rodents in Africa. Cape porcupines are covered with flat, bristly hairs and have both quills and spines. Their spines are up to 20 inches long and their quills can be 12 inches long.

Red Panda

You are reading correctly! Our favorite red panda, Wyatt, will have a female red panda joining him. Bringing her own unique personality and traits, we are very excited to have her meet Wyatt later this summer. And, yes, we hope to announce in the future the arrival of red panda cubs!

Six-banded Armadillo

This scaly mammal is already making her home in the Treasures building where she has been a big hit with Zoo staff. Joanna is actively digging and exploring her habitat which she shares with Linus, our Linnaeus's two-toed sloth.











Giant Anteater

As its common name suggests, the giant anteater is the largest of four anteater species. An adult can get to be more than six feet long. Their unusual snout houses a long, sticky tongue which can measure nearly 20 inches and it's really useful for slurping up insects. We are in the planning stages now and hope for the anteater's arrival this summer.

Giant Pacific Octopus

Joining us again in 2019 is the giant pacific octopus. True to its name, it is the largest of all octopus species. Average weight for an adult is over 30 pounds. They are considered one of the most intelligent of all invertebrates and they have very acute vision. Come see this amazing animal when we open in March.

Observation Bee Hive

Peer into the world bees inhabit! The enclosed hive will be on the Waterfall Trail where you can see more than 2,000 bees hard at work. Bees will enter and leave the hive at a point far away from zoo visitors. You can learn the biology of bees, their important role in our ecosystem, and what you can do to support their conservation. This unique viewing opportunity will open this summer.





Von der Decken's Hornbill

Named after German explorer, Baron Karl Klaus von der Decken, the Von der Decken's hornbills are ungainly looking birds with large bills - black on females and males have a red and cream colored bill. They can reach 2 feet in length which makes them one of the smaller species of hornbills. They will land at the Zoo early this summer.

Geoffroy's Spider Monkey

Endangered Geoffroy's spider monkeys will be swinging into the Zoo this summer. They are recognized for their extremely long, spidery limbs and prehensile tail which acts like a fifth limb. They are native to Central America where they live in forests. Look for their arrival this summer.

Lake Sturgeon

With a life span of over 100 years, this armor-clad fish has an interesting story to tell. They are the oldest and largest native fish in the Great Lakes and a threatened species in Michigan. The timing for their arrival in the Aquarium is still in planning stages but we hope it will be this season.










RENDEZOO 2019 Celebrating 30 Years of the Wildest Party in Town

Matching Gift Challenge

Thank you so much to everyone who supported our year end funding efforts. Your gift has made an incredible difference. Because of you, John Ball Zoo achieved the matching gift challenge of \$77,000 offered by the Michigan Council of Arts and Cultural Affairs (MCACA).

In all, you have helped us raise more than \$154,000. Because of this we can create a dedicated Intensive Care Unit, add needed new equipment to the examination and surgical room. reconfigure and equip the necropsy and pathology suite, and upgrade the quarantine areas of the veterinary hospital. These improvements allow us to do even more for the animals and ensure that we can continue to provide top level veterinary care.

Who knew dental work could be so adorable?

During an annual exam, our vet staff discovered that Slyde, our male river otter, had fractured the tip of a canine tooth. That can be a serious health risk if bacteria gets in and causes infection. We asked Dr. Lynn Happel of Eastown Veterinary Clinic to assist us by performing a root canal on Slyde.

Dr. Happel has extensive specialized training in veterinary dentistry and has performed root canals for several of our animals here at the Zoo.

OTTER DENTISTRY

The procedure consisted of removing all of the contents of the tooth's pulp canal, flushing and disinfecting the canal, then filling and sealing it to prevent infection. We are happy to report that Slyde was a perfect patient and his procedure was a success. He has recovered very smoothly.

Zoo's Wildlife Conservation Fund Reaches Worldwide

From the Gulf Coast of Florida to Sulawesi, Indonesia, John Ball Zoo helped advance fieldwork, research, and education. The Wildlife Conservation Fund was started in 1985 by John Boyles and Dick Faber of Mr. Fables Restaurants. Since then it has provided small grants to over 160 projects.

The Fund is still supported through donations. Your sponsorship in our Animals! Animals! program makes conservation happen. Think about helping by sponsoring one of our animals today. The 2019 funds will help support the worthy work being done for wildlife listed below.

Maun Animal Welfare Society - Botswana

This project aims to prevent the transference of the fatal canine distemper virus (CDV) to African Wild Dogs. The vast majority of domestic dogs in Botswana live on unfenced properties and roam freely in search of food. With no sterilization, uncontrolled breeding perpetuates the cycle of disease, illness and its ease of transference. Over the past 30 years CDV has made the jump from domestic animals to a wide range of hosts including the African wild dog. With only an estimated 3,000 animals left in Botswana (5,000 worldwide). MAWS aims to vaccinate 70% of domestic dogs (3,000-4,000) surrounding the Okavango Delta, creating a "ring fence" of vaccinated dogs to stop the disease from spreading.

Forsten's Tortoise - Indonesia

Severe habitat destruction combined with collection for the bushmeat and pet trades have reduced the population of this species dramatically. Surveys are in progress to accurately determine their distribution and to address the need for status updates and increased protection. The project initiates community-based species monitoring programs which track daily activities like foraging, nesting and reproductive behaviors to help determine the ecological requirements of the species. A captive breeding program will be developed and a release site has been identified. Once staff are sufficiently trained and the area is improved, project leaders will initiate the release of animals, employ the monitoring program and begin captive breeding.





Tsavo Cheetah Project - Kenya

This project works to scientifically inform the Kenya Wildlife Service, the Kenyan Highway Authority and construction companies for environmental assessments and alignment and passageway recommendations. A six lane mega expressway is being built that will run through east and west Tsavo National Parks. The purpose of the project is to provide security and passageways to protect cheetahs and other wide ranging animals like elephants and wild dogs. The project employs camera traps, Cheetah Scouts and research to advise on the placement of passageways and work with the local communities to mitigate animal-human conflicts.



Primate Care Training - Pan African Sanctuary Alliance (PASA)

The Pan African Sanctuary Alliance (PASA) is the largest association of wildlife centers in Africa. Its 23 member organizations across 13 countries are securing a future for Africa's primates and their habitat. PASA member wildlife centers are leaders in the rescue, rehabilitation, and reintroduction of great apes and monkeys. They work closely with government agencies and law enforcement to combat wildlife crime and trafficking. Collectively, PASA member centers care for over 3,000 primates, most of whom have been confiscated from wildlife traffickers or bushmeat poachers. This grant will provide professional training, crucial to the welfare of the animals, who often need specialized treatment to recover from the trauma they have experienced.



Gulf Bee Project Auburn University - Alabama

There has been little effort to preserve these bees as sand dunes continue to be converted into urban beachfronts. This project will use demography and habitat data to examine how we can preserve these small populations. To do this requires that efforts concentrate on helping small, often isolated populations grow. The goal is to determine the mix of floral ecotypes that work best to maintain the bee populations at their current sites. State and federal land managers can use the resulting seed mix reccomendation as a low-cost tool to support current populations. There are also Gulf bee populations in less suitable habitat near developments - specific seed mixes in these areas can directly improve those habitats.



Limbe Wildlife Center, Green Project - Cameroon

The Green Project is a long-term community-based project that provides alternative incomes and sustainable livelihoods to indigenous, ex-hunting communities. Local people are engaged to harvest and provide high-value foods through sustainable agriculture that enhance the diet, health and well-being of the primates (14 or more rare species) in rehabilitation at the Limbe Wildlife Centre (LWC). The project is a priority because it not only contributes to animal welfare and hunting reduction, but significantly contributes to poverty alleviation and better prepares the animals for being released into the wild.



Empowering Community for Wildlife Conservation - India

There is sharp rise in leopard mortality caused by conflict with villagers in Jaipur, India. This is Rajasthan's unique community participation project for leopard conservation in Jaipur District. This project empowers 165 Rural Community Members to become wildlife Defenders who closely monitor poacher activity. Legal empowerment of rural members will strengthen a grassroots network and put a check on wildlife crime in the region. This project will revive the age old Indian tradition and cultural practices of healthy sustainable coexistence with nature and wildlife.
